Some essential meetings are switching to online conference calls, although a lot of usual work has come to a temporary halt, so some meetings are not needed at the moment. Our Centre Coordinator, Chris, and our Liaison Worker, James have both become 'furloughed workers' as their work isn't possible from home or online. Our Arts Enabler and Administrator, Leonie is temporarily taking her work online and she's doing some useful forward- planning. Some of you as keyworkers will doubtless be working harder than ever. This is what the current Methodist Vice-President, Clive Marsh has to say of the Covid-19 lockdown. Do aspects of this list relate to your experience?: "Ask where is God being revealed now, as people cope, adjust, show compassion, help neighbours, find new ways of connecting, stop their busyness, support the weak, learn the value of rest."

Our Circuit Superintendent Paula Hunt has suggested that members of the Circuit all pause to pray at 7pm, particularly remembering those who are ill or who are in the frontline of tackling this virus, all over the world. This in turn is derived from an initiative of Churches Together in England, suggesting we light a candle of hope in our windows on Sunday evenings. Time to Reflect

Think about the last time you saw the Queen in a procession, perhaps on television, at the State Opening of Parliament, or the Trooping of the Colour, or a royal wedding. How did she travel? Either in a limousine or a stately coach most likely. Have you ever seen her arrive at such an event in a battered white van? But that is the equivalent of what Jesus is doing here. He is coming to Jerusalem as King. That much the prophet Zechariah makes clear. He prophesies after some of God's people returned from exile in Babylon to Jerusalem. But they had no king, and it was dubious whether they wanted one because kings had not done them much good in the past. But God promised them a king who would be different from any king they had known. Firstly, he would be victorious. That was unusual, though not absolutely unknown in the history of Israel and Judah. And secondly, he would be humble, coming on a donkey - the common working animal in the streets of the city. His victory too would be unusual. It involved dying on a cross, bearing the consequences and responsibility for the disobedience and rebellion of all God's people so they can reign in life. We too can share in his victory, if we are prepared to believe in Jesus as God's chosen deliverer, to ask forgiveness for going our own way rather than his, and to commit ourselves to walking with him the way of the cross.

Take a time to sit quietly

For Christian people, that through suffering of disunity there may grow a rich union in Christ,

let us pray to the Lord, Lord, have mercy

For those who are tempted to give up the way of the cross, let us pray to the Lord, **Lord**, **have mercy**
